2. Other Related Measure With HFMD Outbreak

- There are **7858** cumulative cases with **129** new cases detected. The highest number of new cases was from **Miri** Division followed by **Mukah, Sibul** and **Kuching** Divisions respectively.
- **15** new hospital admissions were reported. There is one ill case in Miri hospital. The same child is still ventilated in ICU.

Highlights:

- On 3rd April 2006, Sarawak Health Department had inspected about 13.8% of the preschools, TABIKA and TADIKA in the state. Of the 37 localities that had been issued closure orders, 31 (83.8%) were inspected, out of which 13 (42%) were still suspected to have cases. These cases will be confirmed by doctors today.
- As for those premises without closure order, 195 (12.1%) out of 1598 premises in total had been inspected. 24.4% premises were suspected to have HFMD cases.
